Questions and Answers update May 2017

Questions and Answers update April 2017

When will the Inspector make his decision?

The inspector will review the evidence of the appeal during the next six weeks. A response is not expected until early May.

If the inspector hasn't made a decision, how does this affect the offer of Reception places?

As the school is awaiting the decision of the inspector, 30 places will be offered in Reception for September 2017

Questions and Answers update March 2017

When is the Building Appeal?

The Planning Inspector will hear the building appeal on the morning of 29 March 2017. All Parents, prospective parents, relatives and friends are welcome to come along to the Bromley Civic Centre where the appeal hearing will begin at 1000 am. We look forward to seeing you there.

Questions and Answers update January 2017

What was the outcome of the letter of refusal and next steps?

The board of directors reviewed the reasoning of the referral and in liaison with the Local Authority Education team and architects have decided to appeal decision. An

appeal application will be submitted to the independent planning inspector who will review and set a timetable for the appeal.

Questions and Answers update December 2016

Will the school appeal the refusal of the planning application?

The Board of Directors will wait for the letter giving the detailed reasoning for the refusal. They will agree the next steps.

Questions and Answers update November 2016

What date has been set for the 3rd planning decision?

The date has been set for the 3rd November 2016

What was the outcome of the meeting of the planning committee on the 3rd November?

The Committee voted three for; three against and one abstention. The Chair voted against the proposal.

What happens next?

The school will receive a letter in the next week, indicating the reasons for the refusal. We will then discuss with the Education Committee and Architects possible next steps.

Questions and answers update October 2016

The points for deferment will be debated at a planning meeting on 3rd November

What if the planning is not approved?

The school will review the objections received and after taking appropriate advice will decide if there are grounds for an appeal. Given grounds, the school will begin the appeals process which can take up to 26 weeks.

September 2016 update

We welcome our new reception children and families to RF & RP. The children have been fabulous and settled quickly into the routine of school life.

Year 1 children have made the smooth transition into their new classrooms and routines on entry in the morning and collection at the end of the day from the main playground.

Year 1 have settled into the newly refurbished Year One classrooms. The new library is open and each class is timetabled to enjoy the resources. The new ICT room located opposite Year 2 classroom is fully fitted and operational.

Why is the expansion needed?

Farnborough Primary School is an Ofsted rated 'Outstanding' school. The Government has made funding available as part of the Department for Education (DfE) Targeted Basic Needs

Programme to expand schools like ours; where there is a need for high quality school places.

Farnborough is an excellent school which is always forward thinking; planning for the best opportunities for our children, staff and families. The expansion is needed to accommodate the growth of the pupil population in the Crofton and Farnborough ward that we serve. We will also be able to provide our pupils with enhanced facilities for teaching and learning across the curriculum including: sports, music and arts.

What will the impact of the expansion be on Farnborough pupils?

The expansion of the school will provide our pupils with: new classroom spaces, state of the art facilities for ICT including infrastructure and hardware, improved learning resource rooms to facilitate research and pupil support. There will also be a new small hall/studio, medical room and sick bay looking after pupils' health and well-being. Ultimately, all these improvements will ensure that our children have new learning opportunities and support fit for the 21st century.

What will the impact be on the local community?

All building works will take place on the school site with limited, if any, impact on the local community and these will be managed by a project management company. The

school will provide regular updates to the local community regarding the building programme, on the FAQs page .

Our aim is also to ensure our new facilities are made available for community use once the new buildings are open.

What will be the impact on pupils during the building programme, if planning consent is approved?

There will be minimum impact. The school has completed significant building programmes over the last 10 years where full risk assessments concerning health and safety compliance were completed and adhered to by all stakeholders. This ensured the success of the projects within a safe and timely manner.

The building programme itself will also bring the additional benefit of a real life learning opportunity. Our pupils will be offered a range of activities linked to construction including health and safety, design, using IT in construction and applying maths skills that will develop their understanding of progress, succession planning and hands-on, practical real-life learning which can be used across the whole curriculum.

What will be the impact on our children's curriculum?

The curriculum and learning opportunities will be enhanced rather than impacted on in any negative way. With regard to the physical environment; three classes will be rehoused in modular buildings for the duration of the build and they will be fully equipped. These will be sited on the willow walk and next to the BT land. The banking will be dropped to playground level to aid accessibility. Groundworks to accommodate these classrooms will not take away any of the hard playground space. Once the building is completed these classrooms will be removed and the space will become additional hard playground space.

The curriculum areas will continue to be broad and balanced providing rich learning opportunities for our children.

Are lunchtimes going to be extended in order to facilitate additional pupils joining the school?

No, each year group will have one hour for lunch with the exception of the Reception classes who need an additional ten minutes to support them in their routines. The school lunchtime runs from 11.50am to 1.30pm in order to accommodate universal free school meals. All children in Reception and Key Stage 1 are entitled to a hot school lunch free of charge.

Will my child do less PE because the school is two-form entry?

No, each year group will experience the full PE curriculum as recommended by the DfE of 2 hours a week. Sport and physical education will take place both indoors and out with opportunities to participate in a range of extra-curricular sporting activities.

What is happening to the library?

The library has always been a part of a larger resource room. From September the library will become a defined room which can be independently accessed and as part of the expansion plan will be relocated into a larger space in our existing building.

Will my child have less access to ICT whilst the building programme is ongoing?

No, the expansion programme enables the school to introduce wider usage of mobile technology in the form of laptops and iPads, to support the curriculum and the development of computer skills. There will also be resource centres for our existing ICT hardware which will provide lunchtime and after-school facilities.

Will there be sufficient toilet facilities for the number of children in school?

Yes, the school follows the Health and Safety Executive (HSE) guidelines at all times.

Improvements to the existing facilities will enable the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) and infants to access their own bathrooms from September taking us over and above the guidelines and the expansion programme will see further upgrades to the toilets.

Will changes to education funding locally and nationally effect our school?

Yes, the changes to the local funding formula will mean a cut to the delegated school budget in 2017. The Government 2016 budget highlighted significant cuts in education funding by 2020 estimated at 73 million pounds. Schools need to plan strategically to insure viability and success. As a larger school and one that works within a group of schools; financial stability and consequently the resourcing and staffing within the group will be more secure.

What are the current timescales for the expansion?

A planning application is presently with the local planning authority and it is due to be discussed at committee at the end of July 2016. The date has been set for 14th July 2016.

What was the outcome of the planning meeting on the 14th July?

The decision was deferred because the Councillors want clarification on the number of site parking spaces and road safety.

What happens next?

Over the summer holidays work will be completed on the toilets, Year one classrooms and library.

What are the timetables if planning consent is approved in July?

Groundworks will begin early in the Autumn Term with completion expected late Spring 2017.
